Teddy Roosevelt Approves -Protect America's Public Lands!

GREEN – State has made considerable efforts in opposition to national public land takeovers; passed pro-public land bills or defeated anti-public land bills; counties have opposed public land takeovers.

YELLOW – State has made some steps in opposition to national public land takeovers.

ORANGE – State has made little movement in opposition to national public land takeovers.

RED – **CAUTION!** National public lands in these states are in danger of disappearing! Anti-public land bills have passed through the state legislature and counties have noted their support of the public land takeovers by the state.

How do I raise my state's score?

- Check with your state wildlife federation for upcoming land grab bills. Contact you legislator and say vote "no."
- Push for your county to sign a resolution against large-scale land transfers.
- Highlight an exceptional leader with grit who stands up for our public lands.

Montana

- Public lands: 28.9%
- Loss of state lands: 13.56%
- 1 pro-public lands resolution failed
- More than 12 land grab bills failed

Nevada

- Public lands: 81.1%
- Loss of state lands: 99.9%
- 1 land grab resolution passed
- 2 land grab or compromised federal management bills failed
- 10 counties support public land takeovers and provided funding to the American Lands Council

- Loss of state lands: 16.67%
- 1 land grab or compromised management bill passed

Eastern States of note

Missouri

Puerto Rico

• 1 bill (Congress) that contained a provision to transfer Viegues National Wildlife Refuge to Puerto Rico - provision deleted from the bill
