

## FACT SHEET OF STATES WITH TRANSFERABLE LANDOWNER TAGS

### 1. ALL STATES HAVE CHOOSE-YOUR-OWN-WEAPON SEASONS (ARCHERY, MUZZLELOADER, & RIFLE)

- **Colorado:** Archery, Muzzleloader, First-Fourth Rifle Seasons (6 Tag Avg)
- **Utah:** Early Archery, Early Muzzleloader, First Rifle, Second Rifle, Late Muzzleloader, Late Archery (6 Tag Avg)
- **Nevada:** Early Archery, Early Muzzleloader, First Rifle, Second Rifle (4 Tag Average)
- **New Mexico:** First Archery, Second Archery, Muzzleloader, First Rifle, Second Rifle (5 Tag Avg)

> **Wyoming:** Archery and Rifle Together (2 Seasons, 1 Tag Average)

### 2. 4/5 (80%) OF TRANSFERRABLE HAVE STRONG PRESENCE OF PRIVATE LAND-ONLY TAGS

State Without Private Land Only: **Nevada** (80% Public Land) with 2.5% Deer/Antelope Landowner Tag Limit.

> **Wyoming:** No Private-Land Only Options (Cow elk & pronghorn = exceptions)

### 3. ELIGIBILITY BASED ON LAND/HABITAT BENEFIT

To justify that the landowner is contributing (feeding animals, providing habitat, decreasing damage). It gives biological or economic reason for the extra benefit.

> **Wyoming:** No longer required to prove animal use days with WGFD.

#### 4. 50% OFFER PUBLIC HUNTING AS CONDITION OF TRANSFERRABLE TAGS

Utah and New Mexico offer public access as part of the transferrable tag program with Utah's CWMU Public Draws and the EPLUS system in New Mexico.

*Note: While Nevada does not have access tied to landowner tags, Nevada does allow folks to hunt private land that is unmarked by fence or signage, so long as the landowner has not given verbal notice to the individual.*

**> Wyoming:** *Public access is not a requirement in the landowner tag system.*
